Developmentally Appropriate Practice explained... Developmentally Appropriate Practice is a set of guidelines designed to promote children’s best learning and childhood development. Educators must take into account 3 very important pieces of that in order to make best practice decisions: Child Development; Each individual child; Each child’s social and cultural background; Developmentally Appropriate Practice is based on the research that we know about how children learn and develop.

Developmentally appropriate practice is a comprehensive educational perspective that supports optimal healthy development for every child. Developmentally appropriate practice embraces both continuity and change; continuity because it guides a tradition of quality early learning and change as it incorporates new research, knowledge, and science in regard to children’s development and learning.

Exploring developmentally appropriate practice — Better ...

Developmentally appropriate practice is about making sure children have fun so that they will learn. Preschoolers can’t learn on demand—they learn because they want to. Teachers take play really seriously. We use play intentionally to ensure each child makes progress toward speci?c learning goals.
