What is a gothic tale?
Gothic fiction began as a sophisticated joke. Horace Walpole first applied the word ‘ Gothic ’ to a novel in the subtitle — ‘ A Gothic Story ’ — of The Castle of Otranto, published in 1764. When he used the word it meant something like ‘ barbarous ’, as well as ‘ deriving from the Middle Ages ’ .

The origins of the Gothic - The British Library
Gothic fiction, which is largely known by the subgenre of Gothic horror, is a genre or mode of literature and film that combines fiction and horror, death, and at times romance. Its origin is attributed to English author Horace Walpole, with his 1764 novel The Castle of Otranto, subtitled (in its second edition) "A Gothic Story".

The discovery in the early 19th century of the European folk-tale tradition added to the mix new and more disquieting supernatural creatures like vampires, werewolves and zombies. The Gothic mode is now more powerful and more prevalent than it ever has been and popular culture ’ s way of thinking about death is largely in terms of that legacy.
